During Program Year 2015 Jefferson County expended more than \$1,000,000.00 in CDBG funds to provide a suitable, living environment and safe, decent, affordable housing to over 40,000 low/mod income persons. These endeavors included the completion of nine (9) Public Facility activities funded through program years prior to the 2015 program year, and fourty-one emergency housing rehabilitation cases. Also during Program Year 2015, Jefferson County completed construction of 56 units of Special Needs Rental Housing for the Elderly by leveraging more than \$10 Million in HOME funds.

During the 2015 program year (October 1, 2015 - September 30, 2016) Jefferson County has expended over \$1,000,000.00 in CDBG funds to address the high priorities and specific objectives identified its Consolidated Plans. Those priorities included \$757,325.17 for public facilities and \$387,487.10 for affordable housing. This careful use of CDBG funds has allowed Jefferson County to provide decent housing and suitable living environments for over 40,000 low/mod income residents. All Program Year 2015 public facility activities are undergoing the environmental review process.

Although construction has been completed on HOME activities, those activities are pending final payment and final draw of invoices prior to completing the activities in IDIS. Therefore, those activities will be reported under the program year 2016.

Narrative

Nine (9) public facilities were completed during Program Year 2015 (October 1, 2015-September 30, 2016). Eight (8) of the nine public facilities were located within municipal boundaries. Those municipalities included the cities of Brighton, Fairfield, Clay, Graysville, Midfield, and Rosedale. Each of the municipal areas had only one (1) activity except for the city of Fairfield where three (3) public facility activities were completed during PY 2015. Only one (1) public facility completed was located in unincorporated Jefferson County in the New Castle Community.

Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

No HOME or CDBG housing rehabilitation projects were completed during the reporting period. Nine (9) CDBG public facilities were completed. No funds were leveraged. However, two (2) agreements involving the HOME program were executed during the reporting period which will leverage \$1,931,689.00. Construction has not begun. Construction for fifty-six units of HOME rental housing was completed and fully leased, but all funds have not been drawn. The project leveraged \$10,050,828.00.

Jefferson County has excess HOME match from prior Federal Fiscal Years that covers the match liability for the reporting period. No publicly owned land was used to address needs identified in the plan.

The goal of providing one affordable housing unit to a non-homeless household was not met because the only Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) application received was subsequently withdrawn. The CHDO applicant decided they would rather propose to do rental housing development at a later date instead of a homeownership project. The goal of providing forty affordable housing units to special-needs households was actually met in that fifty-six units were completed and leased to eligible households, however, since all of the funds were not drawn during the reporting period, the accomplishment will be reported in the following year.

Given the small number of proposals received coupled with the impact of the new HOME Rule, future action plans will define activities as broadly as possible to enhance our ability to attract as many financially sound proposals from developers with a strong track record as possible.

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

Jefferson County partners with One Roof (the lead agency for the local Continuum of Care) and other local homeless service providers to reach out to homeless persons for the assessment of their individual needs. Jefferson County is also in constant communication with One Roof in the drafting of the Coordinated Assessment Policies and Procedures.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Jefferson County takes an interactive approach in the coordination of services with the local Continuum of Care (CoC) in order to address emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless individuals and families. The needs, availability and gaps are submitted to Jefferson County by One Roof (Lead Agency for the local CoC).

Through the 2015 Action Plan funding cycle, Jefferson County was instrumental in the support of agencies that provided transitional supportive housing and permanent housing to homeless individuals who are addicted to alcohol and other drugs; that provided shelter to homeless families with minor children; provides day shelters and transitional housing programs for women and children; shelter for homeless victims of domestic violence; transitional housing for single women and families; day care for homeless children; after-school activities for homeless children of school age; and that provided services to homeless families.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Jefferson County assisted low-income, especially extremely low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless by providing homeless prevention services to qualified applicants. The County also continues to work closely with the CoC in the coordination of prevention programs in implementing Discharge Coordination policies for foster care, healthcare, mental health, and the correction system.

Child Welfare: The State of Alabama Department of Human Resources developed policy mandates that all youth in the care of the State of Alabama through the Department of Human Resources (foster care)

are evaluated by their case managers at high school graduation or upon aging out of the system, whichever comes first, for placement in transitional housing programs managed by Gateway, a non-McKinney Vento funded program.

Physical Health Institutions: In spite of years of work on a Coordinated System of Discharge from Health Care, there is no policy in place.

Mental Health Insitutions: State policy prohibits discharge (DC) of clients into homelessness: Alabama Department of Mental Health (DMH) policy for state facilities is that DC planning is done by case workers with consumer involvement and input. Patients are DC'd to family, certified group homes or permitted boarding homes ONLY.

Juvenile and Adult Corrections: CoC member, AIDS Alabama, works with receptive local, state and federal correctional facilities to provide discharge services.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Jefferson County has helped homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness; facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units; and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again by making Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing funds available to local service providers. Local service providers must submit annual applications for Emergency Solutions Grant funding to Jefferson County for upcoming program year funds. Funds are awarded on a competitive basis within the categories allocated within that year's One-Year Annual Action Plan.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

Jefferson County continues to support the efforts of Consortium Public Housing Authorities (PHA's) to address the needs of public housing and public housing activities through the execution of Letters of Consistency supporting their funding initiatives. Jefferson County further supported the efforts of Consortium PHA's to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and encourage their interest and efforts to move to homeownership through the same mechanism and by working with them with its HOME homeownership assistance program. Jefferson County also enlists the help and support of the Consortium Public Housing Authorities during the Open Season period.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The Jefferson County Housing Authority continues to collaborate with local banks and mortgage lenders in an effort to provide homeownership and credit information to its public housing residents. JCHA periodically holds homebuyer workshops, financially literacy seminars, and self-empowerment seminars. Primary homeownership focus is given to available mortgage products, lending practices, fair housing practices, how to secure a mortgage through credit worthiness, the importance of obtaining a home inspection, insurance, and the importance of obtaining a realtor.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

There are currently no troubled PHAs in Jefferson County, Alabama for which assistance is needed. However, should any become troubled, Jefferson County will continue to work with them in addressing the PHA needs and providing residents with opportunities.

CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

Jefferson County did not take any actions to remove or ameliorate land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment because those potential barriers did not effect housing activities during the Program Year.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

During the 2015 Program Year (October 1, 2015-September 30, 2016), Jefferson County completed construction on 56 units of Spcial Needs Rental Housing for the Elderly in the City of Tarrant. Rents for the one-bedroom units are 21% below the maximum High HOME Rents. Rents for the two-bedroom units are 19% below the maximum High HOME Rents. There is a limited amount of rental subsidy available and Program maximums can be difficult to pay for some tenants, especially the elderly. By lowering the rents, tenants without vouchers can still afford the units thereby creating an actual net increase in affordable units rather than just moving the same tenants with vouchers from unit to unit. Lower rents also help ensure full occupancy and the financial stability of the project over a 20 year Period of Affordability. The project included State HOME funds, LIHTC and a private loan, which leveraged over \$10 Million for Jefferson County's HOME Program.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

A lack of funding is the main reason for the difficulting in addressing underserved needs in Jefferson County. The main effort Jefferson County has taken to address this issue with non-housing strategies was to offer applicants for non-activities an opportunity to share in the cost of the activity such as providing the architectural/design services, or monies contributed towards the cost of construction.

In terms of housing, Jefferson County entered into two (2) agreements for Homeownership Assistance with Greater Birmingham Habitat for Humanity to construct seventeen new homes for qualified low income home buyers. These home buyers might have difficulty obtaining financing from a commercial lender due to lack of income, down payment, or credit issues. The Habitat model allows for a lower down payment and lower monthly payments. In addition, they portfolio their loans so they have more flexibility in credit approval than a commercial lender.

Jefferson County issued a Request for Proposals for Special Needs Rental Housing for the Elderly during the reporting period. No proposals were received.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Housing: a) In the city of Tarrant, fifty-six (56) units of special needs rental housing for the elderly were completed; b) fifty-four (54) housing rehabilitation jobs were completed for qualified homeowners; and c) Housing counseling was made available to income eligible residents of the Consortium.

Non-Housing: Jefferson County through its One Stop Career Center has four (4) main goals to assist in the anti-poverty strategy: 1) create a delivery system that meets the needs of both employers and job seekers for a range of services, including customized services; 2) create an effective and cost efficient transitional support system to promote job retention; 3) create an integrated, results oriented career center system that provides easy access for both job seekers and employers to an array of quality services that promote workforce development; and 4) maintain a system that will empower individuals with the knowledge to choose the services they require, and develop a system that will make local service providers accountable for meeting those needs. Jefferson County's eligible ESG Homeless Prevention applicants are also referred to the One Stop Career Center in efforts to help them gain and remain self-sustainable.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Jefferson County continues to implement its Consolidated Plan through its Office of Human-Community Services & Economic Development (formerly the Office of Community & Economic Development) which serves as the lead agency for the Consolidated Plan. The County has worked with a number of agencies both public and non-profit in delivering services to the residents of the County. Jefferson County's HOME program has solicited outside sources of funds through both public and private sectors including Low Income Housing Tax Credits, State HOME funds and private grants. The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program and the Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program has worked with the local Continuum of Care and a variety of non-profit entities to support Continuum of Care initiatives and provide public services benefiting the homeless, those at-risk of homelessness, as well as low- to moderate-income individuals and families.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Jefferson County continued actions to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. The HOME program has solicited outside sources of funds through both public and private sectors including Low Income Housing Tax Credits, State HOME funds and private grants. The ESG program worked through a variety of non-profit entities to support local Continuum of Care efforts. The ESG program also worked with the non-profit sectior and private housing sector to provide housing and/or prevent homelessness for qualified ESG applicants. Jefferson County has also continued to hold several neighborhood meetings in which the public of various interests were invited to attend. During these meetings Jefferson County staff distributed information about Community Development programs and also received feedback and presentations regarding services provided by

others that can supplement Community Development programs such as legal assistance.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

- 1. **Cost Burden**: The Housing division rehabilitated 54 homes for low and moderate income persons who cannot afford to pay for needed housing repairs.
- 2. The County has contracted with ClasTran in the amount of \$309,000.00 for senior transportation.
- 3. The state of Alabama has entered into an agreement with Barber Company for the construction of a new Career Center that will better assist job seekers in finding employment to have funding to enhance housing opportunities.
- 4. The Department has entered into a counseling agreement with the Jefferson County Housing for Fair Housing, Credit Counseling, Homebuyer Education; and Foreclosure prevention.




